There will be lots to do at our Branch Library this fall. First we have a Red Cross Blood drive early in September. Then comes our BIG BOOK SALE staffed by an incredible crew of volunteers who have worked twice a week for the past three months; they have been examining and sorting the thousands of donations that have come in – and we're grateful to our donors.

The Friends Annual Meeting is on the horizon, and before too long Election Day will be coming up. Get prepared for the propositions which will be on the ballot by coming to the presentation of the League of Women Voters.

Our popular Coloring for Adults program is continuing.

There will be a talk by a USC clinical psychiatrist about the latest research on available and future treatments for Alzheimer's disease.

HOT-OFF-THE-PRESS BOOKS

HOTP are located on the "NEW BOOKS" shelves, next to the Information Desk. HOTP may be borrowed for seven days and must be returned to this Library. HOTP cannot be reserved or renewed. (However, you may reserve titles through the Library's larger collection and "Hold" system.)

As of August, the Library will now be paying for one-half of this expensive subscription – 25 newly published books a month. In the past, the Friends have been paying for the costly purchase of all HOTP Books – since the program was initiated. Selection and acquisition of books is explained at the bottom of our webpage. Librarians notify the Friends when HOTP Books are received and placed on the Library shelves; we immediately date and list them on our website.

AN UNUSUAL DONATION

Each week, Friends of the Library receives donations of hundreds of books to be sold in its used bookstore or at its quarterly book sales, with the proceeds being donated to the Encino-Tarzana Branch Library. The donations are reviewed and categorized by FOL's faithful band of sorters, who spend two mornings every week in the endeavor.

Occasionally, this work reveals something unusual. This was the case when a small leather bound book entitled, ***The Complete English Cook; Or, Prudent Housewife***, was found. It had a somewhat worn leather binding and was about the size of a smaller trade paperback book. It triggered some curiosity, particularly since it was determined to have been published and printed in Leeds, England, in 1773—three years BEFORE the Declaration of Independence. In addition to the book's age, research revealed that the book was unusual in several other ways: 1) at that time, no cookbooks had yet been published in what a few years later became the United States of America; 2) this book was written for use in private homes; at that time most cookbooks were written by chefs for the benefit of other chefs, not for home use which included unusual recipes (for example, roasted swan and fricassee of pig feet and ears); and (3) it had few if any burn marks. Since cooking at the time was over open flame, most extant copies did have such burn marks.

The Friends Board of Directors recognized that the book could be sold to a rare book collector either directly or through a professional book dealer, or donated to a public institution for preservation and permanent retention. The decision was made to preserve the volume by donation. The Los Angeles Public Library already had at least one copy in its collection and declined the donation offer. The Huntington Library, in Pasadena, however, accepted the Friends' donation offer. The rare book curator drove here to the Encino/Tarzana branch library to pick up the book rather than risking having it damaged in the mail.

So now, ***The Complete English Cook; Or, Prudent Housewife***, has a new and excellent home, thanks to our anonymous donor, our diligent Friends Used Bookstore volunteers, and our Friends Board of Directors!

LIBRARY REPORT FOR ENCINO-TARZANA BRANCH

Over the past few weeks, I have met so many wonderful faces as I began my role as Acting Senior for the Encino-Tarzana branch. When I moved to Los Angeles from the Midwest in 2008, Encino-Tarzana was the first branch library that I visited. I loved the new titles on display, the exciting programs that were listed on the monthly calendar, and the large windows that showed plenty of sunlight. At that time, the sunlight was the most important thing to me – it was my first warm winter! It seems like I have come full circle as a regular library patron to now as temporary Branch Manager.

Our Summer Reading Program has recently ended with great success. On a daily basis I was hearing positive feedback from families about how fun the programs were this year. Some of the programs funded by the Friends of the Library included a drum concert, reader's theater, specialty science, fun crafts, and a wonderful magic show. We also added special Adult Programs for the summer including Book Binding Sessions and a Managing Clutter workshop. We concluded our Summer Reading Program with a wonderful concert by Jennifer Seidman in August. It is through the Friends continued generosity and hard work that we are able to give the community quality programs that help enhance their library experience.

This is the time of year when all of us are slightly exasperated from all the programs and preparations of our busy season. We don't have much time to rest, however, as we are already gearing up for the fall. This past week we welcomed a new Student Zone worker who works here Monday-Thursday from 3-6pm to help children and teens sign in on our laptops specifically for students K-12. It's a useful service because it provides students a safe and quiet place to study – plus they receive free prints for their homework. We are also adding a few books in Hebrew in our collection as a loan from Central Library for a short duration. If this collection circulates well, we hope to add Hebrew books to our collection permanently. In addition, I am meeting with the local police department to ensure our location is safe for everyone.

Please consider donating blood for the Red Cross on Friday, September 2nd from 10AM-4PM. Donors will receive a free duffel bag! In addition, we have clinical psychiatrist John Danner who will present information on Memory and Treatments on Alzheimer's disease on Thursday, September 15th at 12:30 PM. Also, please be on the lookout for other special programs in October including a presentation from the League of Women Voters and Medicare 101.

Of course, our most popular event is the Friends of the Encino-Tarzana Branch Library B-I-G Two-day Book Sale on Friday, September 9 and Saturday, September 10th. Doors open at 9:30! The Los Angeles Public Library website has a wealth of information and resources that folks need but don't know it exists in this handy format! For example, I just referred my kids and grandkids to the "Job Seekers" resource and got a hearty "Thanks!!"

First, let's explore - Go to <http://www.lapl.org> and click on this icon and "Los Angeles" at the top left-



Surprised?? See – here's what's currently happening in Los Angeles!

Next, look at all the topics under the words "**Collection & Resources**" at the top left of the page. That's where I found "**Job Seekers**" and "**Money Matters**" for my family. Click on those items that interest you. Pay special attention to **Online Learning** – continuing education at places that are **FREE** with an LAPL Borrower's card. I can personally recommend **Lynda.com** and its excellent online video courses to help you learn or enhance your business, technical, and/or creative skills. And "**ADA Services**" for Persons with Disabilities, show lots of info and resources.

Now, click on **Collections and Resources** and again a surprise at all the fabulous resources – for fun or info. Be sure to click on "**Library Blogs**" and see what librarians in each subject department are recommending. And, if you get stuck – the **Overview** shows the contact data for "**Ask a Librarian.**"

Continue to the right of **Collections and Resources**, and click on these:

--"**Locations & Hours.**" Don't miss clicking on **Central Library > Planning Your Visit > Art & Architecture in Central Library** – what an artistic treat!

- "**What's On**" shows you current events within LAPL and branch libraries for adults and kids.
- "**Get Involved**" is great fun and you get a wonderful feeling of commitment and doing good.
- "**About LAPL**" – includes the Press Room with all kinds of interesting topics.
- "**Library Store**" – is a great place to browse – but also view their online shopping.
